Taking as its point of departure the year 1869—when the word "homosexual" was first coined—the book maps the complex transformation of same-sex desire from behavior into identity, a radical shift that altered the course of modern history. In visual art, this change is not only traceable but profoundly expressive. Featuring paintings, sculptures, photographs, prints, and film stills, *The First Homosexuals* reveals how artists registered, resisted, and redefined emerging notions of sexuality around the world.

Edited by art historian and curator Jonathan D. Katz, Professor of Practice at the University of Pennsylvania and a founding figure in Queer Studies in Art History, and Johnny Willis, Curatorial Fellow at Wrightwood 659, this volume offers an unprecedented global perspective. With contributions from scholars such as Gloria Steinem Endowed Chair Tirza True Latimer, Eduardo Carrera, Catherine Gonnard, Ara H. Merjian, and Patrik Steorn, among many others, each essay focuses on a specific geographic or cultural context, including Japan, Australia, South America, and Indigenous North America.

Artists featured include Claude Cahun, Rosa Bonheur, Tamara de Lempicka, John Singer Sargent, Egon Schiele, Saturnino Herrán, Beauford Delaney, Van Leo, and Marsden Hartley—alongside lesser-known but equally significant figures whose work is presented here with fresh critical attention. Together, their images offer a richly layered portrait of an identity in the making.

The First Homosexuals is more than a catalogue—it is a vital addition to the canon of queer visual culture, reframing how we understand the intersections of art, sexuality, colonialism, and resistance at the dawn of the modern era. This is an essential reference for scholars, students, curators, and anyone interested in LGBTQ+ history and the power of art to shape identity.
